Common Strategic Policy 2024-2026 (P.21/2024): Amendment by Deputy I. Gardiner of St. Helier North aimed to support the health provisions and economic prosperity of older people, ensure homes are designed so an ageing population can continue living independently, and support lifelong learning, retraining and flexible roles are available for older workers. The Amendments proposed by the Council of Ministers support the principle of that Amendment but insert additional requirements to consider this alongside rising levels of disability and declining birth rates.

- The health, housing and economic implications of an ageing population, with its associated rising levels of disability, and the support required to ensure positive outcomes.
- Yes, children experience this problem differently from adults, as the ageing population and older age-related disabilities only apply to adults.

No children will likely be affected by the decision as it is aimed at older people. The reference to declining birth rates is only included as it is relevant to the effect this has on wider population policy planning, which includes the levels of working age population and the levels of care needed to support an ageing population.
