Constituency Statistics Report 2026

Introduction

This report brings together key statistics about the constituency of St Saviour to help inform and support constituents ahead of the June 2026 elections in Jersey. By presenting clear, accessible data on the makeup of our community, the report aims to provide a useful snapshot of local demographics, social characteristics and housing trends relevant to voters, candidates and anyone with an interest in the constituency.

The information in this report has been sourced from Statistics Jersey, drawing primarily on the most recent [Jersey Census in 2021](#) and the [Jersey Opinions and Lifestyle Survey 2025](#). These statistics offer the most reliable and comprehensive picture of life within St Saviour and cover areas such as population, age structure, employment, household composition and other key indicators that help illustrate the character of our constituency.

Key Figures

Population

The total population of St Saviour was **13,904** which made it the most populated constituency. It was almost 50% larger than Grouville & St Martin.

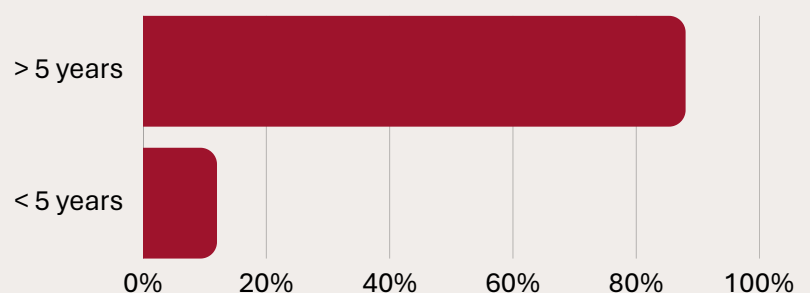

Length of residence in Jersey

Approximately **1 in 8** (12%) of St Saviour's residents had lived in Jersey for fewer than 5 years and 88% for more than 5 years.

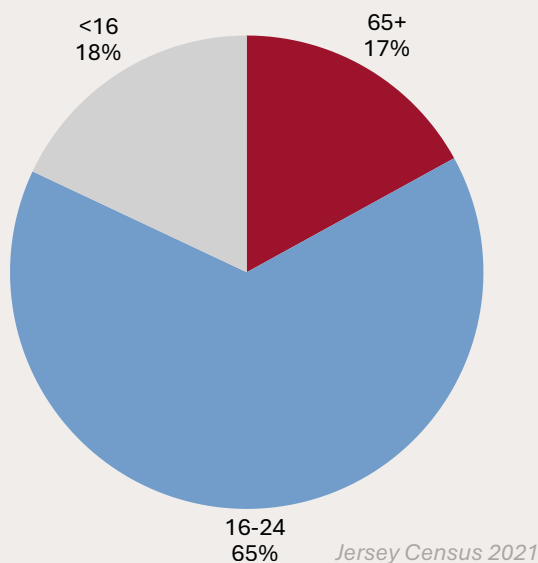

Key Figures

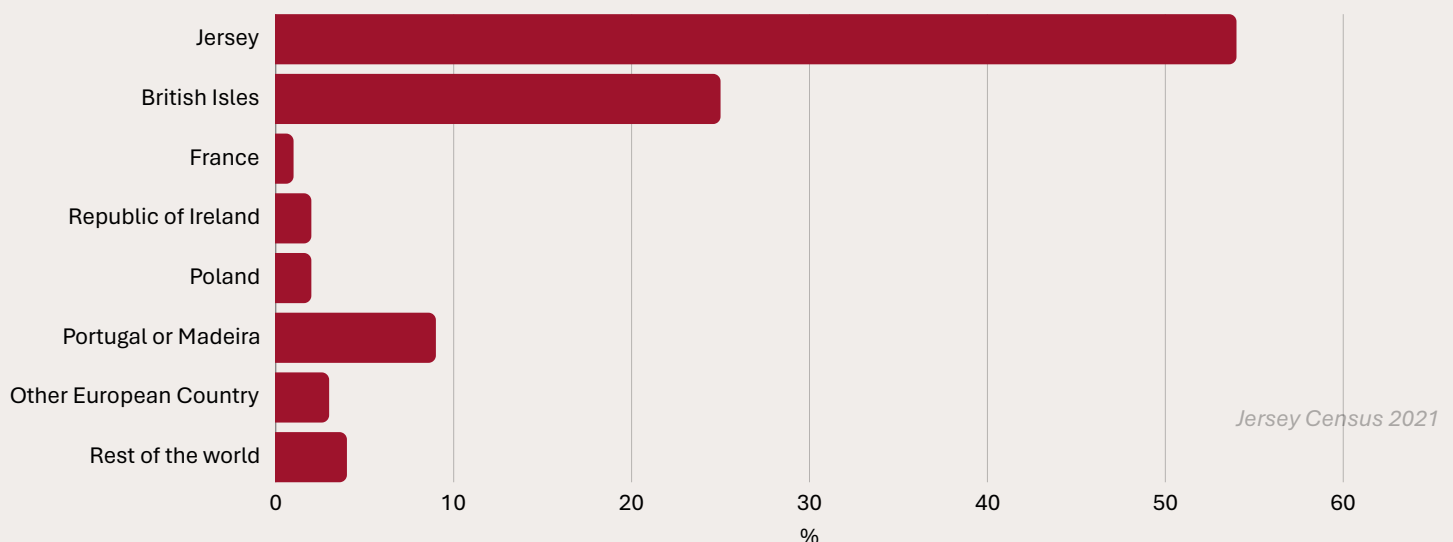
Young, working-age and elderly people

St Saviour had the **fourth highest** percentage of working-age people (**65%**) out of all the constituencies and third lowest percentage of over 65s (17%).



Place of birth and ethnicity

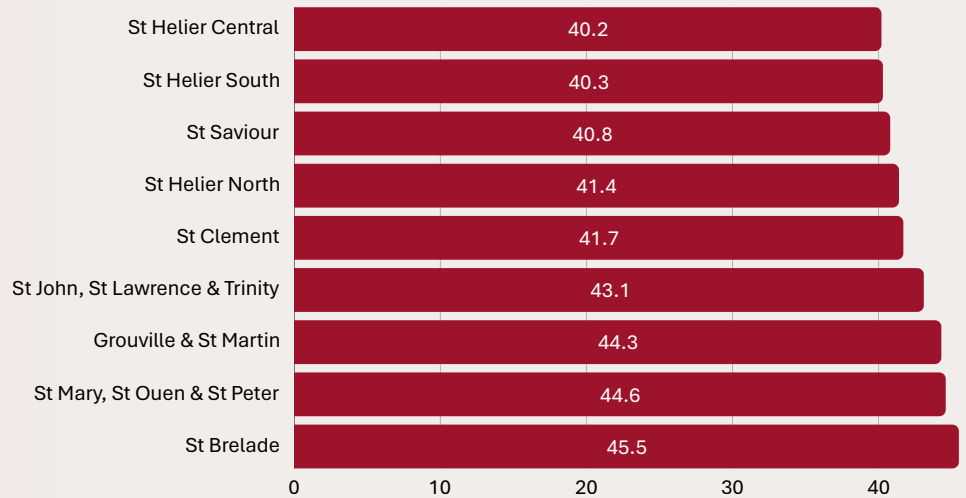
St Saviour had the joint second-highest proportion (**54%**) of Jersey-born residents of any constituency. This was compared with 39% in both St Helier South and St Helier Central, which had the lowest proportions.

Average age

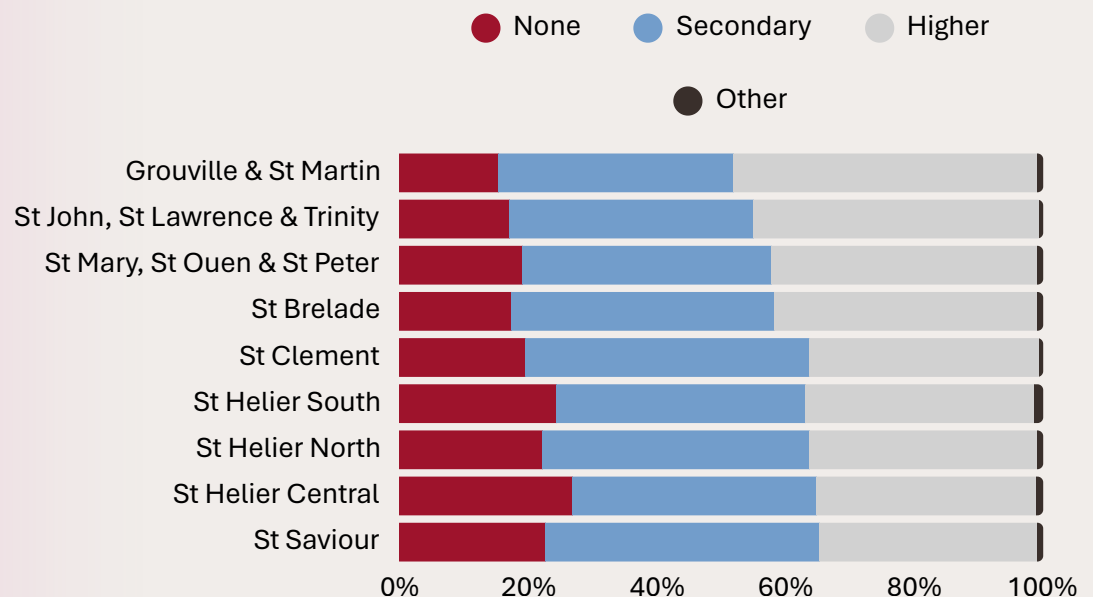
The mean age of St Saviour residents was **40.8 years**; the third lowest of all constituencies.

Higher Education Attainment

Only **34%** of St Saviour adults had studied to higher education, which was the joint second-lowest of all constituencies. This was compared to Grouville & St Martin, where almost half (47%) were educated to this level.

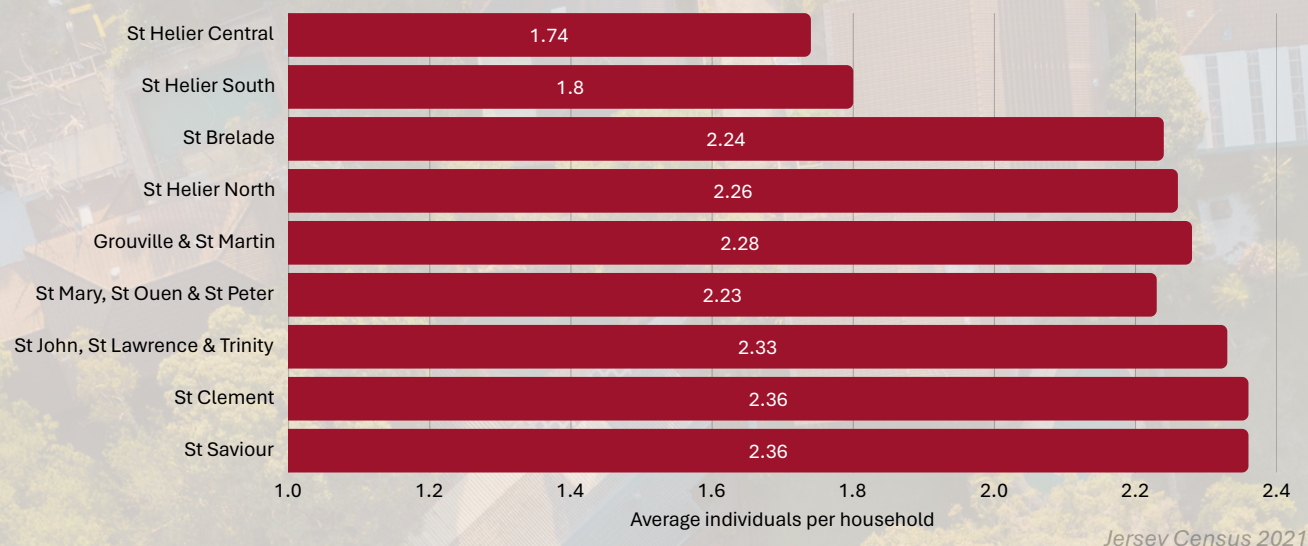

Housing & Households

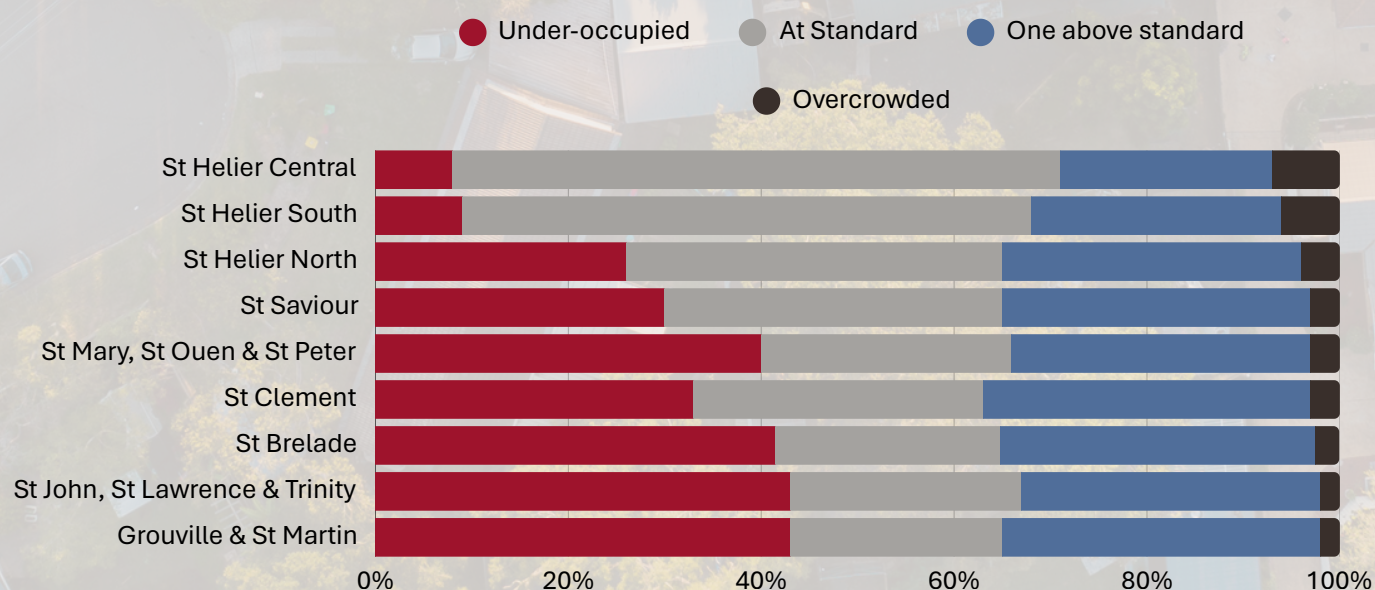
Size of households

St Saviour had the joint highest average household size of all constituencies. An average of **2.36** individuals resided per household compared to 1.74 in St Helier Central.



Overcrowding

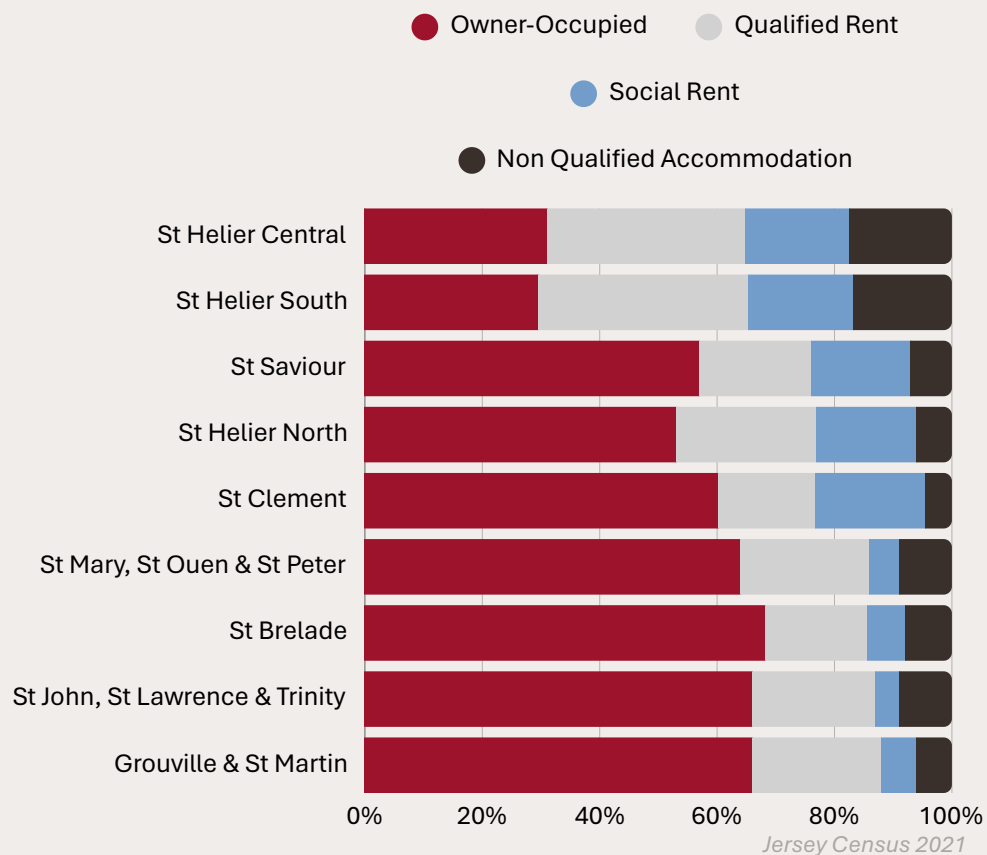
St Saviour sat mid-range in terms of household occupancy levels, with **3%** of homes classed as overcrowded and **30%** considered under-occupied.



Housing & Households

Tenure

St Saviour had the joint fourth-highest percentage of households who lived in social rented properties (**17%**), with only St Helier Central (18%), St Helier South (18%), and St Clement (19%) having had higher proportions.



Cars per household

The average number of cars per household in St Saviour was **1.51** (fourth lowest of all constituencies).

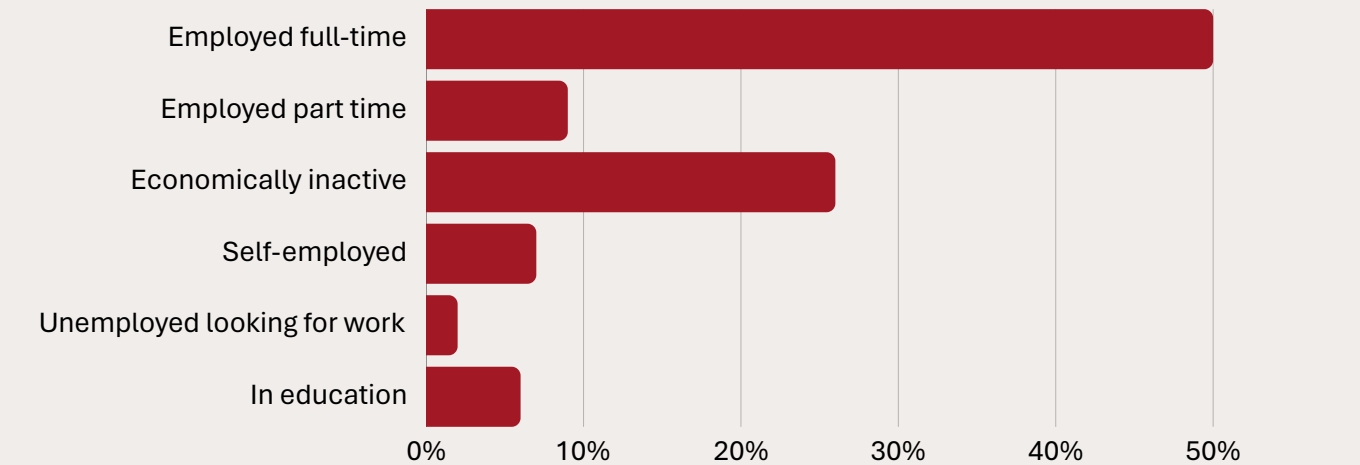


Cost of Living

Economic status

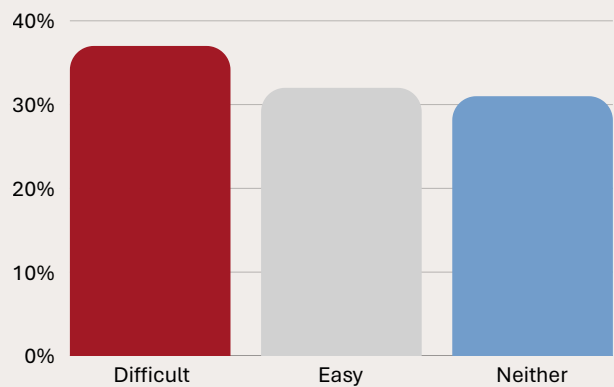
St Saviour had **50%** of adults in full-time work, the joint fourth-highest rate (highest: St Helier Central 62%; lowest: St Brellade 39%). It also had 26% economically inactive adults, the joint fourth-lowest (highest: St Brellade 35%).

Coping financially

In St Saviour, 37% of households found it difficult to cope financially, the third-highest rate. St Helier South had the highest (42%) and St John, St Lawrence & Trinity the lowest (17%).



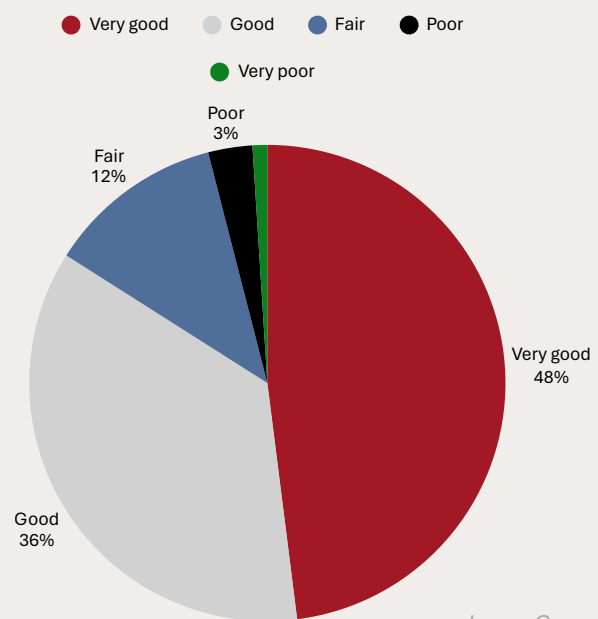

Health & Wellbeing

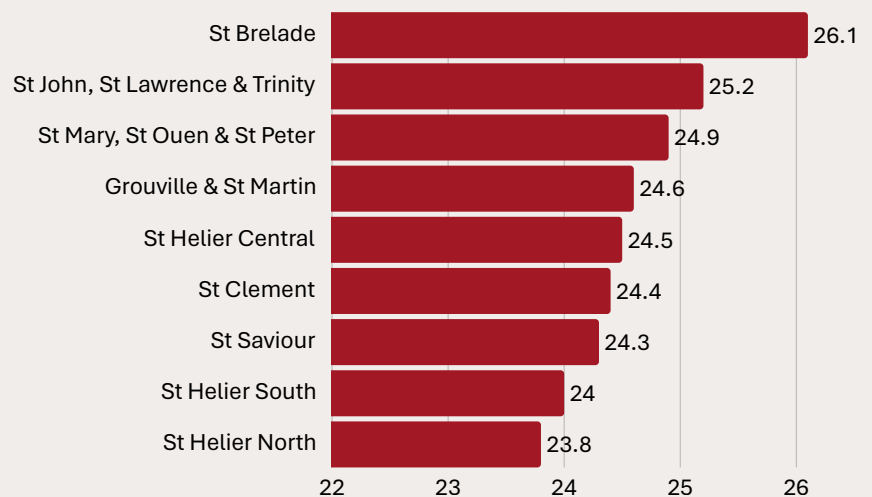
Physical and mental health

St Saviour had the joint third-lowest share of people who reported being in very good health (**48%**). The joint highest proportions were in St John, St Lawrence & Trinity and Grouville & St Martin (both 54%), while St Helier Central had the lowest (42%).

Residents of St Saviour scored the third lowest for their overall mental wellbeing (including life satisfaction, happiness, anxiety and feeling worthwhile) with a mean score of **24.3**.

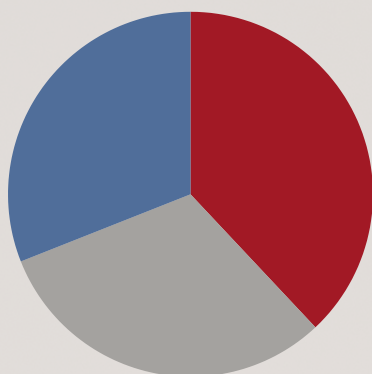

Civic Engagement

In 2022, **67%** of the St Saviour voting age population were registered to vote. However, the percentage of those who voted was just **43%**.

Voting intentions

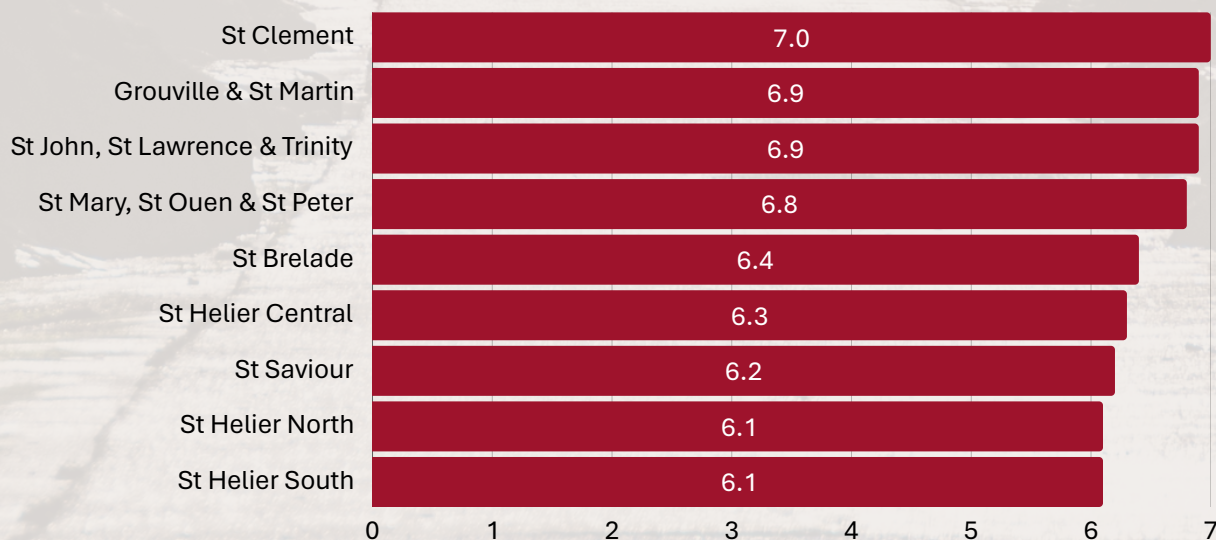
St Saviour had a mid-range result, with **38%** of respondents saying they planned to vote in the June 2026 election (compared with 60% in Grouville & St Martin). **31%** said they wouldn't vote and **31%** were unsure.

Trust in Government

St Saviour had the lowest mean trust score in Government at **5.4** (overall result range was 5.4:6.2) compared to St Helier South which had the highest at 6.2.

Trust in Your Constituency

St Saviour had the third lowest mean trust score in its constituency (**6.2**).
