Children and young people that go fishing (either recreationally or intending to do so commercially in the future) will have to follow the size limits that are in force at the time (current ones in the 2001 Regulations or those proposed in this proposition, if adopted).</p> |
| <p>3) What is the likely impact of the proposed decision on children and on their rights?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identify any potential positive OR negative impacts and include indirect impacts on children and their rights as described in the UNCRC • Will different groups of children be affected differently by this decision? <p>This proposition, which seeks to improve the management of important local stocks, is unlikely to impact on children or on their rights. It could be considered that the objective to appropriate conserve and manage the marine environment is of benefit to all children, outlined in the guiding principles of the UNCRC.</p> |
