## Request to make phone masts public

We know where they are, Environment Minister says. Now Islanders should be told

JERSEY Telecom will be asked to make their list of mobile phone masts public.

Environment Minister Freddie Cohen says the company have now provided a list of the masts' locations to Planning and he intends to ask them whether it can be made available to Islanders.

Meanwhile, following the release of a report by Health and Social Services into mobile phone masts and health, the Senator has agreed that temporary planning permission be granted to Cable & Wireless to begin to establish their network. But this will only be for testing to be carried out before permanent permission is considered.

Senator Cohen said: 'Jersey Telecom have around 100 masts and have applied for consents for many. There was no health scrutiny process but the equipment available in the UK is all required to be below international limits.

'Jersey Telecom have now provided a list of the locations to Planning. I will be asking them to

allow us to make this public and to confirm that each location has been checked to ensure that it is below international limits.

He went on to say that he was in the process of issuing planning consents for parts of the Cable & Wireless network, but only so that tests could be carried out. 'Initial consent will be given for testing, and permanent consent will be given once we are satisfied that total emission levels at base station sites is below international limits.

• There is improved consultation by the network operator with the community prior to the selection of a base station site.

 Emissions from base stations meet guidelines for public exposure, and the States seek to ensure that operators voluntarily agree to comply with levels lower than international guidelines.
