	c) Drug Strategy : Deputy Tadier said that a review could examine issues such as the implications of prosecuting individuals for possessing small amounts of classified drugs and possible alternatives to holding large numbers of non resident couriers in the island's prison. It was recognised that this would be a controversial subject as well as requiring a great deal of careful investigation. Deputy Tadier was requested to refine the scope of his proposal.	MT

Item 16	The Panel met Senator F.G. Le Gresley to discuss his proposition (P.19/2011) requesting the Council of Ministers to reconsider their decision not to hold a Committee of Enquiry to investigate any unresolved issues in relation to child abuse in the Island.	
	The Panel was of the opinion that there were a number of fundamental

questions about the past management of children's homes, the monitoring of staff and procedures for dealing with any reports of abusive behaviour.

It was noted that the previous Council of Ministers had outlined these questions in a report to the States (R27/2008) in which the then Council had indicated the intention to hold a full public enquiry once the criminal process had been completed.

Senator Le Gresley said that it was regrettable that the Care Leavers Association had not been consulted before this decision was taken.

The Panel regarded the present Council's decision, as reported in R.8/2011 to be unsatisfactory. This report had been received by members on their desks in the States Assembly on 1st February 2011 without prior notice and there had been only a limited opportunity to respond to a statement issued by the Chief Minister at the same meeting.

The Panel believed that the States Assembly should be given the opportunity to debate the requirement for an independent public enquiry. The Panel asked Senator Le Gresley whether he would agree to amend his proposition to call for the Assembly to make the decision on holding a committee of enquiry; however, Senator Le Gresley said that he believed it would be more appropriate for the Council of Ministers to take responsibility for the decision as the Council was in a position to determine the source of funding for this purpose. He believed that if the Assembly agreed to ask the Council to reconsider their decision the Council would be morally obliged to approve an independent public enquiry. In the event that they did not agree to change their decision it would still be open to a private member to bring a proposition to the States proposing a public enquiry.

Senator Le Gresley believed that there had been precedents for such public enquiries elsewhere in the UK and that the cost could be less than that estimated by the Council of Ministers.

The Panel agreed to support the Senator's proposition. Deputy Tadier was requested to prepare a press release and the Scrutiny Officer was requested to prepare a draft comment on the proposition.
