Town Mills, Elysée and Cherry
Orchard Court housing estates. Question and
answer (Tape No. 110)

Deputy Maurice Clement Buesnel of
St. Helier asked Deputy Leonard Norman of
St. Clement, President of the Housing
Committee, the following question -

``Will the President say what the
total costs of the following housing
estates were when they were built, the
year when building was completed and,
if they have since been modernised or
refurbished, the total cost of such
work for each estate -

Town Mills Estate
Elysée Estate
Cherry Orchard Court?"

The President of the Housing Committee
replied as follows -

``In answering this question I shall
take each estate in turn. I should,
however, point out now that only
limited records exist of work carried
out on the estates prior to 1981, and
that the information provided does not
include the many thousands of pounds
spent on day-to-day general
maintenance and upkeep of the estates.
Figures given also exclude site
acquisition costs.

Town Mills

The Town Mills estate comprises 18 three-bedroomed houses, built in 1935 at a cost of #10,000. At current prices the estimated building cost would be about #1,350,000.

Although only limited records exist of work carried out on this estate before the last ten years, it is known that all houses were modernised between 1973 and 1975 at a total cost of about #54,000. At today's prices this represents a cost of about #250,000.

Major works carried out in the last ten years consist of the following -

Every five years external decoration has been carried out, and on the last occasion, 1990, this cost #9,830.

The important consideration concerning this estate is the Committee's plans for the immediate future.

The Committee has included in its 1992 revenue expenditure estimates for Town Mills the following -

In addition, #120,000 has been included in the Committee's 1992 capital proposals to cover external landscaping and road improvements.

These requests have already been submitted to the Policy and Resources and Finance and Economics Committees in the Committee's estimated capital

and revenue expenditure for 1992.

Elysée Estate

Elysée Estate comprises six one-bedroomed flats, 94 two-bedroomed flats and maisonettes, and 85 three-bedroomed flats and houses, and was built in 1965 at a total cost of #577,000. At current prices, the estimated building cost would be about #14,000,000.

Major works carried out over the last ten years consist of the following -

Every five years external decoration has been carried out, and on the last occasion, over the two years 1990/91, the cost was #116,000.

The Committee is proposing a major redevelopment of the estate on similar lines to that currently being carried out at Nicholson Park, with the first phase estimated to commence in 1996, assuming funds can be made available. This proposal was included in the Committee's five year capital programme submitted to the Policy and Resources Committee in 1990.

Cherry Orchard Court

Cherry Orchard Court comprises 14 one bedroomed, and 43 two-bedroomed flats, built in 1962 at a cost of #138,000. At current prices, the estimated building cost would be about #3,750,000.

Major works carried out in the last ten years consist of the following -

Every five years external decoration has been carried out, and on the last occasion, 1989, this cost #34,750.

The Committee has plans for further improvements for this estate during the period 1993 to 1995. These include the following -

- window replacement
- new heating system for those units not covered in 1990
- improved insulation
- improvements to internal communal areas."

European Community - members right of entry to Jersey in 1992. Questions and answers (Tape No. 110)

Deputy Maurice Clement Buesnel of St. Helier asked Deputy Michael Adam Wavell of St. Saviour, President of the Defence Committee the following questions -

1. In 1992 nationals of Continental countries which are members of the European Community will acquire right of entry into Jersey for the purposes of seeking employment and other reasons.

Will the President confirm that nationals of such countries

previously employed in both the agricultural and tourism industries on a permit basis for eight months of the year will then be able to be employed in Jersey on a year round basis?

2. When accommodation is offered to such persons in a live-in situation on farms and at hotels will it also mean that staff from those countries will be able to bring dependants to the Island to live with them?"

The President of the Defence Committee replied as follows -

1. I believe the Deputy will have received a copy of the Policy and Resources Committee's consultative document on immigration policy which in the large part addresses the issues to which this question refers.

The Island may restrict the entry of all nationals of Continental countries which are members of the European Community. However, the Island does not at present exercise frontier control on those arriving in the Island via the United Kingdom. Once in the Island the rights of those concerned to take employment or occupy residential accommodation can only be restricted in accordance with the terms of Article 4 of Protocol 3 of the Treaty of Accession of the United Kingdom to the European Community. This provides that the Insular Authorities 'shall apply the same treatment to all natural and legal persons of the Community'.

The Island currently does not apply restrictions to British nationals seeking employment. Accordingly, at the present time, no such restrictions apply also to the nationals of Continental countries which are members of the European Community with the

exception of Portuguese and Spanish workers. The latter have remained subject to work permits to date because under the transitional arrangements relating to the Accession of Portugal and Spain to the European Community their nationals also have been precluded from seeking employment in other Member States. It is only in respect of the latter that the position changes in 1992 because of a decision taken this year by the European Community to bring forward the ending of the transitional arrangements from the 1st January 1993 to 1st January 1992, with the exception of Luxembourg where the former date continues to apply.

I understand that later this year the States will be asked by the Policy and Resources Committee to consider a report and proposition on the future treatment of the nationals of all Member States of the European Community including British nationals. If the decision is taken that the treatment of Portuguese and Spanish workers from 1st January 1992 should equate to that currently applied to British nationals and the nationals of other Member States of the European Community, I can confirm that Portuguese nationals previously employed in both the agricultural and tourism industries on a permit basis for eight months of the year will then be able to be employed in Jersey on a year round basis.

2. The position in respect of dependants is broadly the same as for those coming to the Island to seek employment. The Island can exercise control at the point of entry. However, if such control is not exercised over those arriving via the United Kingdom the Island is required to apply the same treatment to all natural and legal persons of the Community including British nationals.

Representatives of the Hotel and Guest House Association and the Jersey Farmers' Union at a recent meeting of the 1992 Group indicated that much of the accommodation provided would be unsuitable for dependants and, in addition, that the terms and conditions of employment for the most part would preclude workers bringing dependants to the Island to live with them in accommodation on farms and hotels."

The Waterfront development.

Questions and answers (Tape No. 110)

Deputy Stuart Syvret of St. Helier asked the Connétable of St. John, President of the Island Development Committee, the following questions -

1. Has any interest been shown in the west of Albert site by private developers and/or have any approaches been made to the Island Development Committee concerning this site?
2. If the answer to the above is yes, who are the parties concerned and have any negotiations taken place concerning any part of the site?
3. In answer to previous questions the President of the Island Development Committee stated that such issues as the sale or lease of the site, the advertising of the site and whether or not the land in question would be disposed of by tender would be decided after the States gave their approval to the Waterfront Plan. Does he not feel that given the importance of these questions these issues should be settled before the States debate the Waterfront report?"

The President of the Island Development Committee replied as follows -

1. There has been a good deal of interest shown by private developers in the future development prospects of the Albert Pier land reclamation site.
2. No negotiations have taken place with any private developer in relation to developing all or part of the reclamation site. By and large, the developers that have contacted the Planning Department have done so informally to demonstrate and record their interest in being considered for development opportunities that might arise. Because of this, I do not consider it appropriate to name the many companies and individuals concerned, until these interests become formalised.
3. I said in response to the Deputy's last set of questions four weeks ago that my Committee believes it more important in the first place for the States to consider what should happen on the reclamation site and the Waterfront in general rather than how and by whom. The Committee does consider the implementation of the plan to be important, but believes there is a sensible and orderly way in which to approach this project. The Masterplan document itself contains a section on implementation and shows how the various proposals might be brought to fruition using both the public and private funds.

I should like to assure the Deputy, and other Members of the States, that no decisions about implementing the Plan will be made without the knowledge and agreement of the States. Indeed, following the approval of the Plan by the States, it is the intention of the Island Development Committee to produce a report for the States, in conjunction with those Committees which will be involved in implementing the Plan, to show how the Plan can be implemented successfully combining the resources of the public

and private sectors.

However, my Committee remains of the view that in the first instance it is more important for the States to agree what should happen in the Waterfront area in the next 25 years."

Working Party to review the Police Force (Jersey) Law 1974, as amended.
Statement

The President of the Defence Committee made a statement in the following terms -

``In furtherance of the recommendations contained in paragraph 7 of the Second Interim Report of the Jersey Judicial and Legal Services Review Committee, the Defence Committee has decided to carry out a broad review of current policies and trends in the policing of the Island and the administration of justice. I am pleased to announce that, following consultations with the Bailiff, the Attorney General and the Comité des Connétables, it has been agreed to set up a Working Party in order to study the recommendations in paragraph 7 of the Report of Sir Godfray Le Quesne's Committee, the working of the Police Force (Jersey) Law 1974, as amended, and any consequential questions which may arise concerning the policing of the Island. The Working Party will also examine the relationship of the two Police Forces (Honorary and States) and allied matters and, if necessary, recommend amendments to the above-mentioned Law.

I am delighted to inform the House that Sir Martin Le Quesne KCMG has agreed to act as Chairman of the Working Party, together with the undermentioned, all of whom have been approached on an individual basis -
