Create new category of benefit entitlement for children and adults who are terminally ill, by creating a bespoke administrative route to fast-track benefit entitlement that will qualify them for the highest level of Income Support impairment component, and then potentially for their carer to apply for Home Carer's Allowance.

Groups of children could include early years, primary or secondary education; young adults; children with additional learning needs; disabled children; children living in poverty; children from particular ethnic backgrounds; migrants; refugees; care experienced children and LGBTQ+ children

Any child who meets the other conditions for the affected benefits, but would not currently qualify as quickly due to a previously longer route for administration

This will only affect a small number of children each year, but it is positive as it makes it easier for them and their families to get financial support – as such, any impact on children's rights would be positive as it will speed up access.
