Ways to reduce single use plastic

- Ensure every parish does their part. I.e. separate paper, glass, tin and plastic
  - Take this further, ensure we are able to recycle more of our plastics as currently only our bottles are recycled. If you look on nearly every plastic food covering, this will have a recycling method.
- More **praise and encouragement** for schools and businesses doing **beach pickup days**. Make it a States incentive, provide the tools and to do it for free.
- **Give** companies and businesses **incentives** to do the same.
