<p>Amendment to Income Support Jersey Law and Regulations to introduce a new component to support adults eligible for Income Support who are also receiving long-term care in their own home.</p>

Groups of children could include early years, primary or secondary education; young adults; children with additional learning needs; disabled children; children living in poverty; children from particular ethnic backgrounds; migrants; refugees; care experienced children and LGBTQ+ children</p>
<p>None. To be eligible for Long-Term Care, a person needs to be over 18. These proposals only impact adults living at home who are eligible for Income Support and are receiving a package of care under the vires of Long-Term Care legislation.</p>

<p>The proposals will not have an impact on children or young people. They will potentially apply to some young adults still living at home.</p>

<p>No. These proposals relate to legislation that only impacts adults. Children cannot receive long-term care packages of care from the Long-Term Care scheme.</p>
