Review of the year

Complaints

Formal complaints received: 12

The number of complaints submitted to my office was the same as in the previous year. However, in addition to formal complaints, I received additional correspondence highlighting either general concerns about elected Members collectively or specific concerns falling short of formal complaints. It is my practice to advise Members whenever concerns are received, whether or not I record them as formal complaints. One correspondent's letter helpfully identified ambiguous wording in guidance to Members and I know that this matter is being addressed.

Three Members self-referred themselves to my office. I welcome such initiatives as proof that Members are conscious of the need for them to display accountability and leadership as set out in the Code of Conduct for Elected Members.
