1. Opening Remarks	
The Chair provided a brief welcome to the Panel's first meeting of 2025.	
2. Records of Meetings	
The Panel approved the records of the meetings held on 4 <sup>th</sup> September, 22 <sup>nd</sup> November and 16 <sup>th</sup> December 2024.	
3. Work Programme	
The Panel discussed its planned work programme for January to June 2025.	
The main focus for the Panel's work programme in the first half of 2025 was the proposed review: 'What protection do children in Jersey have from online harms?' (discussed further under agenda item 6).	
There were two matters that required legislative scrutiny required before the States Assembly sitting on 4 <sup>th</sup> February 2025 (P.87/2024 and P.89/2024, referenced in later agenda items). Also, timing for lodging of amendments to the Police Complaints Regulations had not been confirmed, but this was also expected to require scrutiny time during the first quarter of 2025.	
The Panel discussed other matters that it wished to explore during the whole calender year, but agreed to discuss again at its next meeting, when other members of the Panel had the opportunity to contribute.	
The Panel recalled that, in October 2024, the Minister for Justice and Home Affairs had offered a briefing to the Panel about the Ambulance, Fire and Rescue Headquarters and requested that officers make arrangements for the briefing.	KdC
The Panel had previously agreed to arrange a primary school visit in the new year, but agreed to defer this as it was not directly related to its immediate work programme.	
Officers advised the Panel that during both January and April 2025 there were weeks where the Panel would hold three public hearings. This was due to scheduling and availability, and was highlighted as part of the work programme as it was recognised	

that it would create higher concentrations of scrutiny work for members. It was confirmed that the quarterly hearings were more evenly spread in Q3 and Q4 of 2025.	
4. Scrutiny Briefings	
The Panel noted that it was due to receive the following briefings from Government officials in January 2025:

The Panel noted that it would be a tight turnaround to draft and agree a comments paper, if the proposition remained on the Order Paper on 4<sup>th</sup> February 2025; and</li> </ul>	
• 28 <sup>th</sup> January 2025: Draft Police Complaints Regulations.	
5. Scrutiny Review: Draft Children and Young People (Independent Advocates) (Jersey) Amendment Regulations 202- [P.87/2024] (the 'draft Regulations')	
The Panel had received a briefing on the draft Regulations on 6 <sup>th</sup> December 2024 and prepared a draft comments paper accordingly.	
During the meeting the Panel raised additional queries about the Government's consultation on the draft Regulations and the draft code of practice. The Panel considered whether it should write to the Minister for Children and Families (MCF) for clarification on the queried points or, alternatively, if it should highlight these points in its comments paper and ask the MCF to address them in the Assembly debate.	
The Panel assigned responsibility to the Chair to review the queries and instruct Panel officers on the most appropriate course of action. It was agreed that any changes made to the draft comments would be circulated to the whole Panel for its formal approval.	
6. Scrutiny Review: 'What protection do children in Jersey have from online harms?'

1. Briefing: Draft Children and Civil Status (Consequential Amendments) (Jersey) Amendment Regulations 202- [P.89/2024]	
The Panel welcomed the Minister, Assistant Minister and Government officers to a briefing about the Draft Children and Civil Status (Consequential Amendments) (Jersey) Amendment Regulations 202- [P.89/2024] (the 'draft Regulations'), which had been lodged on 23 <sup>rd</sup> December 2024.	
The Panel recalled that the Draft Children and Civil Status (Amendments) (Jersey) Law 202- (the 'primary Law') had been approved by the States Assembly on 19 <sup>th</sup> March 2024. The Panel had undertaken a scrutiny review of the primary Law in its draft form and had presented findings and recommendations in a Scrutiny Report [S.R.2/2024].	
The Policy Officer provided the Panel with a brief recap of the primary Law, which included changes that would:	
<ul> <li>Enable couples who used fertility treatment and donor sperm to become either a father (opposite-sex couples) or second parent (same-sex female couples) and jointly become registered on a child's birth certificate;</li> <li>Enable a same-sex female couple to re-register the birth of their child so that the second parent can be added to the birth certificate;</li> <li>Give a Jersey court the power to make a parental order for a Jersey born child, to enable any couple using surrogacy to become the legal parents of their child in Jersey without having to revert to adoption;</li> <li>Give power to the court in Jersey to make a recognition order for a Jersey born child, to recognise a parental order previously granted by a court in England or Wales;</li> <li>Treat civil partners in the same manner as married couples when registering their child's birth and acquiring parental responsibility; and</li> </ul>	

• Remove the customary law assumption that the husband of the mother was the father of the child.

As expected, consequential amendments would be required to update various pieces of legislation where "parent", or the concept of parenthood was referred to in order to reflect the changes. When the Panel reviewed the Law, it found that 33 pieces of legislation had been identified as requiring further amendment (listed on page 18 of S.R.2/2024).

During the briefing, the Panel was advised that the draft Regulations included approximately 180 amendments across 42 pieces of legislation. It was confirmed that none of the consequential amendments changed the original policy intent of the law and that the proposed changes would effectively map the new definition of "parent" included in the Children (Jersey) Law 2002 and the definitions that expanded the definition of parents that were introduced by the Amendment Law.

The legislation amended in the draft Regulations included all of the legislation previously highlighted to the Panel, with the exception of:

- Bankruptcy (Recovery and Resolution) (Jersey) Law 2017
- Legitimacy and Illegitimacy (Re-registration of Birts) (Jersey) Regulations 1974
- Legitimacy (Jersey) Law 1963
- Legitimacy (Jersey) Law 1973

The Panel was advised that the Government's intention was to propose the abolition of the status of legitimacy in Jersey law, to ensure an equitable position for all children and families, regardless of the marital status of their parents. Whilst it had been confirmed that legitimacy had limited practical or legal relevance, until the position was resolved, only children born into an opposite-sex marriage would be registered as legitimate. It was advised that there would be a number of 'saved provisions' with regards to legitimacy, for example manorial rights.

It was confirmed that further work was underway with regards to legitimacy and that further legislation would be lodged to resolve the position of legitimacy prior to the lodging of an Appointed Day Act to enact the primary Law.

The Panel queried why the Bankruptcy (Recovery and Resolution) (Jersey) Law 2017 was not included in the draft Regulations to be amended, when it had been previously listed as a law which required amendment. Officers committed to revert with confirmation about that and stated that it might have been related to the work on legitimacy.

The Panel was provided with confirmation that the practical changes required to be put in place across various areas of Government service were all underway. The Panel was advised that:

- The development of new Rules of Court was nearing completion;
- New certificates, registers and processes were in development for use by the Office of the Superintendent Registrar;
- There had been engagement with the Assisted Reproduction Unit with regards to the changes that would be required to their consent forms and website information, but it was confirmed that this would be minimal; and
- There had been engagement with the Social Security policy team on parental benefits for new routes to parenthood.

The Panel had previously been advised that the Government would undertake a coordinated communication of changes to the public ahead of the commencement of the primary Law. The Panel asked for further information about that and was advised that a communications plan had been developed and a meeting of all the relevant

departments' Head of Communications would be held in the week commencing 27th January 2025. The Panel was advised that the Government would contact families who were known to be impacted by aspects of the primary Law, for example, those who were likely to apply for a Recognition Order of a pre-existing Parental Order that had been made in England or Wales. However, it was clarified that communications would not just be targeted, there would be broader communications shared with the public to get the message out about the changes. The Panel noted that it had received only positive sentiment from the public when it had conducted its review on the primary Law and asked the Minister and officers what the tone of public feedback had been with regards to the proposed changes. The Panel was advised that no negative commentary had been recorded. The Panel asked how Jersey's position compared to other Crown Dependencies. Officers advised that information was not to hand but committed to revert to the Panel with some information. It was clarified that the primary Law and the draft Regulations would not come into effect until an Appointed Day Act was approved by the States Assembly. The Panel was advised that the Minister for Children and Families intended to lodge the Appointed Day Act in Summer / Autumn 2025, pending the States Assembly approval of the draft Regulations and, also, completion of the work to resolve legitimacy (which

The Panel thanked the Minister, Assistant Minister and Government officers for their time and they left the meeting.

the Panel was advised was at an advanced stage).

The Panel agreed that it would summarise its scrutiny of the draft Regulations in formal Comments, lodged for the information of the States Assembly. It was noted that the draft Regulations were scheduled to be debated in the sitting commencing 4<sup>th</sup> February 2025. The Panel agreed its key points for the Comments and asked its Officer to circulate the draft Comments Paper for its initial review as soon as possible the following week.

The Panel was advised by email that:

Within the CAMHS Early Intervention Team there is a Parent Infant Psychotherapist (PIP). The PIP provides psychological support to parents/carers of 0-5 year olds whilst simultaneously working with the preschool child to build healthy attachments. As well as one-to-one therapy work with parents, or parents and child, PIP also deliver the Mellow Parenting Programme, funded by CAMHS, with Brighter Futures. This programme supports parents to reflect on relationships and interactions with their children to promote positive parenting and being responsive to their children early years needs. Many of the referrals for PIP come from Family Nursing and Home Care (FNHC). The PIP has met with FNHC to ensure close working. and often undertakes joint intervention with Health Visitors. PIP will be introducing regular consultation meetings with FNHC (and other partner agencies) to promote joint working. A number of the Mothers on the MECSH programme (Maternal Early Childhood Sustained Home Visiting Programme) have attended Mellow Parenting and are accessing support from PIP and FNHC.

The Panel discussed follow up actions from its recent public hearing with the Minister for Education and Lifelong Learning on 30<sup>th</sup> January 2025. The Panel noted that information about the UK's guidelines on the use of auto-adrenaline injectors in schools had been shared by email. Officers confirmed that a letter with the Panel's remaining questions and other follow up points would be circulated as soon as possible.
